DONNA'S CORNER

Art for The Just Because or Being a Part of Today's Movement by Donna Ray

How would you want to be remembered? As the only one, the token: for your sexual preference, for your gender, for your race, for being the one-time eventer? Have you always been a social justice artist? Or simply because it's politically correct for the moment right now to be a social justice artist? There will always be a cause to rally around and the cause can last decades. For myself, I do not want all my art to be associated with Black Lives Matter or Malcolm X, no more than I wish to do -Afrocentric art designs only. The questions I ask: How well is your art practice received around the world and does it have meaning? How many grants or awards have you received as acknowledgment for your success as an artist? Is this how you measure your success?

She, her, and hers. I am first a ceramic artist, aiming to be recognized as a multi-disciplined artist working in many mediums and practicing various methodologies to arouse the consciousness of my prospective audiences. Art means many things to many people. It can be used to convey messages and relieve stress from our daily lives. It can be how you make your living to assist in paying your bills.

She, her, and hers, I identify as African American multi-racial, medium to dark brown skinned,

over 50, woman, conege educated, employed at a medical racinity, born severely visually impaired since birth, social justice-driven ceramic artist. I never want to be defined by just my race, sexual preference, age, or class when I design or create art. My sexual preference gender, race, my disability: none of these will be carried or worn around my neck like a tag. I need to be defined in everything that I do as a creative individual who created the body of work.

The fear may always be there about being accepted for myself and the kinds of art I do: no matter which organization I affiliate myself with. In the end what matters most is how passionately I believe in myself and the art I create to share with the world.
